The Florida Artist Group was incorporated in 1949, as a nonprofit organization of practicing artists. Made up of artists whose work has attained national or state-wide recognition, the purpose of the group is to stimulate attainment of the highest standards of creative art within the State of Florida.

Annual Symposium:

Since 1949, the Florida Artist Group has held a symposium and a members' exhibition each year in a different Florida city. Education and other cultural aims are advocated at these meetings through lectures, panel discussions, films and demonstrations. In addition to the symposium and exhibition held in the spring, area exhibitions and meetings are sponsored at other times in various places in the state. The nature of these meetings follows the character of the spring meeting. These meetings also serve to bring the members of the organization closer together.

Members' Annual Exhibition:

The annual Exhibition is juried for awards (currently nine) that are presented at the awards banquet held as part of the Symposium. FLAG hosts an eminent artist, educator, curator or museum professional to act as juror and keynote speaker at the symposium.

The symposium winners, highlights and artwork are already posted on the website. Thank you Judy Kramer and Jim Swallow for making this happen so quickly for our members.

Once a year the Florida Artist Group, an organization of painters, sculptors, printmakers and photographers from around the state, come together for an exhibition that is open to all of its members. This year the host for the show is the Ringling College of Art and Design. Because of the number of members, the organizers wisely decided to use two of our galleries in order to accommodate the number of expected entries. The number and styles of the art we received provided us a way to put together one cohesive exhibition in two

spaces, by using Selby Gallery to display the work that was based on the observable world, and went from the most objective depiction of reality to the most subjective/expressive depictions of reality. Photographs were placed in groups as were most of the paintings and collages that subtly included photographs, used real objects, numbers, letters or words.

The Christ-Janer Illustration Gallery, which is located 30 yards to the south of Selby Gallery, holds the paintings that are abstractions that may or may not have their inspiration in what can be seen or center on the non-objective use of line, shape, color, texture and value. (What do these words actually mean?) The paintings were arranged from images with geometric or curvilinear forms, clean edges and flat colors to the most painterly to once again show the range of the members of the Florida Artist Group.

We would like to thank the 85 members of FLAG for their participation in the exhibition and hope you enjoy the results of their labor and dedication to their art.

Kevin Dean has been director of Selby Gallery since July 1994. Mr. Dean has served as a full-time faculty member at Ringling School of Art and Design since 1985. He teaches in Ringling's Liberal Arts and Art History programs. He was a columnist for the Sarasota Arts Review, and has been a contributor to the New Art Examiner, Art Voices South, the Bradenton Herald, and Sarasota Magazine. He has written catalog essays about Sarasota artist Syd Solomon for the Ringling Museum of Art as well as essays on Aripeka artist Arlene Erdrich for a traveling exhibition. From 1977-79, Mr. Dean served as Executive Director of the Galesburg Art Center in Galesburg, Illinois, and prior to that, taught art in primary and secondary schools in Illinois. He holds an M.A. and a B.A. from Western Illinois University.

Juror



Greetings. I would like to thank all of you from the Florida Artist Group for inviting me to jury your 2012 exhibition. In looking at all of the work in the exhibition, I was immediately impressed by the stylistic variation of the pieces in the show. This told me immediately that there is no attempt on the part of the group to restrict its members to any specific style. I think that this is a rare quality for any exhibiting artist organization.

How do I go about selecting prize winners from such a wide variety of submissions? I first take a fair amount of time (an hour or so) to look at all the work without any attempt at judging or using any

critical analysis. I do this because I firmly believe that looking at work and absorbing its initial impact, is the best way to approach a work of art. Using this procedure I try not to use my own aesthetic, philosophy, or stylistic leanings to color my view of the piece. Of course I will inevitably see certain work that is in direct opposition to my taste - but even then I make it a point not to eliminate anything exclusively on this basis. On my following rounds of judging I try to look at work that either seems strong or actually offends my sensibilities. I then try to understand some reason why each piece has been done in a certain manner. I want to try to comprehend what the artist was trying to do, and see if it was done successfully - that is, was it executed in a manner appropriate to the artist's objectives, subject and style? If it seems obvious that the work was involved in an attempt at creating an illusion, I expect a technical competence appropriate to that endeavor. Conversely, if a painting or sculpture evidences a strong attempt at violating pictorial illusion and craft, I expect to see a piece that abandons and even strikes out against that norm - even to the extent that it refutes what many would consider a contemporary trend. When I see a painting that presents itself as a formal composition, I look for logic within the work that allows me to work backwards and deconstruct the painting itself. However, if it looks formal but contains little or no use of formal analysis - I suspect that it is a decorative painting without reason - or a shallow piece that is simply a rendering of some "stereotype" using the artist's concept of the "look" of formal composition.

This show consisted mostly of work within the mainstreams of either abstraction or realism. Only a few pieces seemed stylistically postmodern. I would have liked to have seen a few more pieces in that category - pieces

that would have strayed further away from emphasis on visual aesthetics and ventured into the world of identity, and political issues.

Some may wonder why I would give the award of "Best in Show" to the piece by Ellen Mason. Here is a rather humble and softly stated work that certainly does not cry out for attention, but like an individual who speaks quietly and "demands" your attention, this work caught my eye on the first round of viewing the exhibition. I realized that the artist may not have intended it, but I was at once reminded of the synchronized flight and swimming of birds and fish when they have joined together and exhibit the behavior of a single animal. Ellen Mason's drawing opened me to the realization that this common activity in nature, may in its essence, point to a very profound concept - the kind that one might spend a lifetime pursuing. I must confess that just minutes after giving out the awards I began to have some reservations about my decisions. But that is the nature of the beast (the jurge's process) as time passes I will conclude that I overlooked some

some reservations about my decisions. But that is the nature of the beast (the juror's process) - as time passes I will conclude that I overlooked some very strong pieces because of some mistake in my reading - because of the difficulty of understanding anything that is truly novel.

Tom Nakashima received an M.F.A. in 1967 from the University of Notre Dame. He taught at the Catholic University of America, and exhibited at Henri Gallery and Anton Gallery in Wash DC. From 1991-2002 he exhibited at Bernice Steinbaum Gallery in NY. Tom is Emeritus Professor at the Catholic University of America and Morris Eminent Scholar Emeritus at Augusta State University. His work is in permanent collections of over 50 public collections including Smithsonian American Art Museum, Mint Museum, Ogden Museum, Muscarelle Museum, and Hermitage Museum, Russia. His numerous awards include: Joan Mitchell Foundation Fellowship, Mayor's Award for Excellence in Artistic Discipline, Virginia Commission for the Arts, and National Printmaking Fellowship, Rutgers Center. His work was reviewed in hundreds of publications internationally, including *Art Forum, Art in America, Art News, New Art Examiner, Art Papers, Wash. Post*, and *NY Nichibei*. Over his 45 years of exhibiting, his works Range from abstract through representational, and his paintings are expressionistic monolithic images, addressing social and environmental issues.

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

Cecily Hangen Outstanding Service Award

This award is being given to Cecily Hangen for her service to the Florida Artist Group
This 12th day of May 2012



Most of us know Cecily Hangen as the tireless worker in all Florida Artist Group functions. She has also held numerous offices in the organization over the years. "I have been a member of FLAG since 1973, President twice and Area chairperson since 1997. I was honored to be President for the 40th anniversary as well as the 50th anniversary. What I love most about FLAG is having the annual exhibition and symposium in different parts of the state, meeting the artists, seeing and showing in new venues, savoring the various local sights, art and otherwise."

Cecily came to art early, "I can't remember a time when I was not doing art. I thought it was too much fun to be a career. That changed when in high school I went to the Parsons Art School in NYC for a Saturday morning art class in fashion design, then I was awarded another class. This time it was life drawing, a little disquieting at age 17. Now I feel every artist, no matter what they paint, should draw from the live model. I regret that I am not doing that now."

This is an impressive beginning for an artist, and Hangen continued to work with top level teachers in excellent schools during her college years, "After high school in 1952, I was accepted to go to Cooper Union Art School, an all scholarship school. The foundation year emphasized architecture as well as 2 and 3 dimensional design. At that time I wanted to be an architect.

Frank Lloyd Wright still is my favorite artist. I continue building my compositions as a construction of many elements."

Her training included some big names among her teachers. "Cooper had a summer program with Yale University Department of Fine Art. I transferred to Yale and spent two years there. Yale was dominated by Josef Albers, a Bauhaus teacher who emphatically insisted that every element in a painting should be there for a reason. His color class was wonderful- no theory, no wheels, no rules, all colors go together. It was just the right amount to have the best color interaction.

Hangen was also able to mix travel with her training, and to work with another famous pioneer of modern art. "During the summer between, I studied printmaking with Jacques Villon (Marcel Duchamp's brother) at Fontainbleau, France. After finishing school, Cecily was able to work in art and design related fields. "The next summer I started as an artist in the display art department in the main offices of the JC Penney Company, and stayed there for two years. The next move was to Washington, DC, where I worked as an advertising artist at WTOP Radio and TV, a Post Newsweek station. After two years I went on to WTTG. I did promotional art for television on air for another two years. I wanted to have more time for painting, so I started teaching elementary art in Frederick County Maryland. My parents moved to Florida. I came for a visit, loved it, and stayed."

In Florida Hangen continued to teach. "I was teaching art at the Norton Museum, the Boca Raton Museum of Art and the Lighthouse Gallery." However, she became dissatisfied with teaching as a way to support her art. "For me teaching inhibits my own painting. For the last 20 years I have been in the art gallery business, 16 years as part owner. Currently I am a salesperson in two galleries."

All the while Hangen has been making art. "My painting started surrealistic. Coming to Florida I painted huge shells. That evolved into my current abstraction of organic forms or half circles and arches designed as a color construction like a piece of architecture. I always shade the forms for a 3 dimensional effect like the Chiaroscuro of Leger and the Renaissance masters. Then I paint the lines on top in reverse shading and often contrasting color. It really is an arrangement of moving stripes. Also I have painted on cubes."

Cecily Hangen exhibits her work actively. "I exhibit my work at the Boca Raton Museum of Art Artists Gallery in Delray Beach and in Palm Beach at the S.Thompson Palm Beach Fine Art gallery and Duaiv Art gallery."

Looking back on her career of making art and in FLAG, She is happy with her achievements, and with the future of the organization. "I am pleased with the new faces on the board and I know FLAG is in good hands for many years to come."
